WHAT IS A LAUDATO SI' ACTION PLAN?

A Laudato Si' Action Plan is your commitment to act towards achieving the Laudato Si' Goals.

Action at every level – local, regional, national and global – is essential in an integral ecology approach. Indeed, possibilities for justice are radically increased when we work together to address the urgent challenges facing us and our common home.

One encyclical, seven goals

In 2015, Pope Francis wrote his encyclical *Laudato Si'*. The letter expresses praise to God and, recognising the beauty and wonder of creation, urges us to address the ecological crises facing the planet.

The concept of integral ecology is central to Pope Francis's letter, the themes of which have given rise to what the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development articulate on the Laudato Si' Action Platform as the Laudato Si' Goals.

An Australian approach

The Australian Catholic Bishops urge all Australian Catholics to join the Laudato Si' Action Platform – "a shared space where the Church develops a bold and active response to the ecological crisis".² They also urge Australian Catholics to develop and implement their own Laudato Si' Action Plan.

Outlining a 4-step cycle, Catholic Earthcare's Australian Guide to Laudato Si' Action Planning complements resources on the Laudato Si' Action Platform. It is offered with the support of Caritas Australia's Earthcare Specialists and Australia-wide Earthcare Communities.





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ECOLOGICAL ECONOMICS



FOSTERING INTEGRAL ECOLOGY

The concept of integral ecology reminds us that our treatment of the planet cannot be separated from social, cultural, economic, political and ethical concerns. Everything is connected.

Integral ecology depends on our collective change of heart about the health and wellbeing of all of creation, especially the Earth, our common home.


Acting with urgency

We know that "human-caused climate change is already affecting many weather and climate extremes in every region across the globe. This has led to widespread adverse impacts and related losses and damages to nature and people. Vulnerable communities who have historically contributed the least to current climate change are disproportionately affected."³

The Laudato Si' Goals, developed from Pope Francis's encyclical *Laudato Si'*, aim to achieve justice by promoting and sustaining integral ecology. The urgent challenge to protect our common home includes a concern to bring the whole human family together to seek a sustainable and integral development, for we know that things can change.

Spark the conversation

Change begins with the formation of the heart. It is sustainable when there is a climate for change and people are engaged and enabled to define, realise and track their shared vision.

Form an Earthcare Working Group

Invite volunteers to help lead your Earthcare efforts. As well as initiating and inspiring ecological dialogue, this small Working Group can take responsibility for overseeing your Laudato Si' Action Planning process.

When assembling your Earthcare Working Group, you may wish to recruit representatives from different roles or interest areas. Whatever your approach, aim to include people with different skillsets and ways of thinking. Also, include people whose voices and perspectives are not always heard. They may have fresh insights and ideas to share!



Self-assess

Self-assess your understanding and practice of integral ecology, of how everything is connected. Examine your current practices. Consider the interconnectedness of humanity and nature. How is this relationship shaping your common life?

Key questions: What are your current approaches to people, place and practice? How are they helping you achieve the Laudato Si' Goals?



Our EARTHCARE SELF-ASSESSMENT TOOL is designed with an Australian context in mind and is one way to undertake your selfassessment. It provides you with a framework for assessing how your current approaches to people, place and practice relate to the 7 Laudato Si' Goals. Intergenerational solidarity is not optional, but rather a basic question of justice, since the world we have received also belongs to those who will follow us.

2 Reflect

Once you've submitted your Self-assessment, it's time to reflect on where you are now, particularly on your community's location and current activities, including in relation to First Nations Peoples and other local communities and ecosystems. Consider how your values and unique strengths relate to the Laudato Si' Goals. Spend time discerning your vision for being a Laudato Si' community.

Key questions: What have you done before? What does this moment in time and place call for? What does it look like when your community is living *Laudato Si*?



Our EARTHCARE REFLECTION TOOL aims to help you prayerfully contemplate how your approaches to people, place and practice reflect your vision for being a Laudato Si' community.



3 Plan

You've self-assessed and reflected on where you are and where you want to be in your Laudato Si' journey. Now it's time to plan your "concrete actions to protect our common home".⁴ This step is about developing your Laudato Si' Action Plan. Planning achievable, measurable actions towards each of the Laudato Si' Goals is the best way to realise your vision.

Key questions: What actions will you take towards each of the 7 Laudato Si' Goals? Who will participate in each action? When will each action be achieved?

4 Act

Once you complete your Laudato Si' Action Plan, share it with others on the global Laudato Si' Action Platform. Let us know too so we can celebrate your progress with you! Then, get busy, putting your plan into action.


